INTRODUCTION

Participate in a transformative urban planning design competition that unites Ukrainian and Canadian student teams for an 6-month exploration. With the goal of rejuvenating a once-destroyed Ukrainian city, each team receives tailored assignments and valuable resources, including industry mentors, workshops, and crucial city insights. By December 2023, these dedicated teams will submit preliminary designs, laying the groundwork for transformation and receiving crucial feedback before winter sets in. In March 2024, final designs are presented, evaluated, and ranked by a panel of judges. Winning teams secure both a well-earned monetary prize. Watch the impact of their creativity unfold as these designs grace exhibitions in Toronto, Canada and Ukraine, embodying the potential of collaborative vision for a brighter future.

CROSS-CULTURAL COLLABORATION:

Students from different backgrounds learn to work together, fostering cultural exchange and understanding.

INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS:

The combination of diverse perspectives can lead to unique and creative urban design solutions.

AWARENESS AND ADVOCACY :

The competition can raise awareness about the importance of thoughtful urban planning and the ongoing war in Ukraine.

EDUCATION & NETWORKING: Participants have the chance to connect with and learn from industry mentors, potential employers, and fellow students.

PROGRAM DETAILS

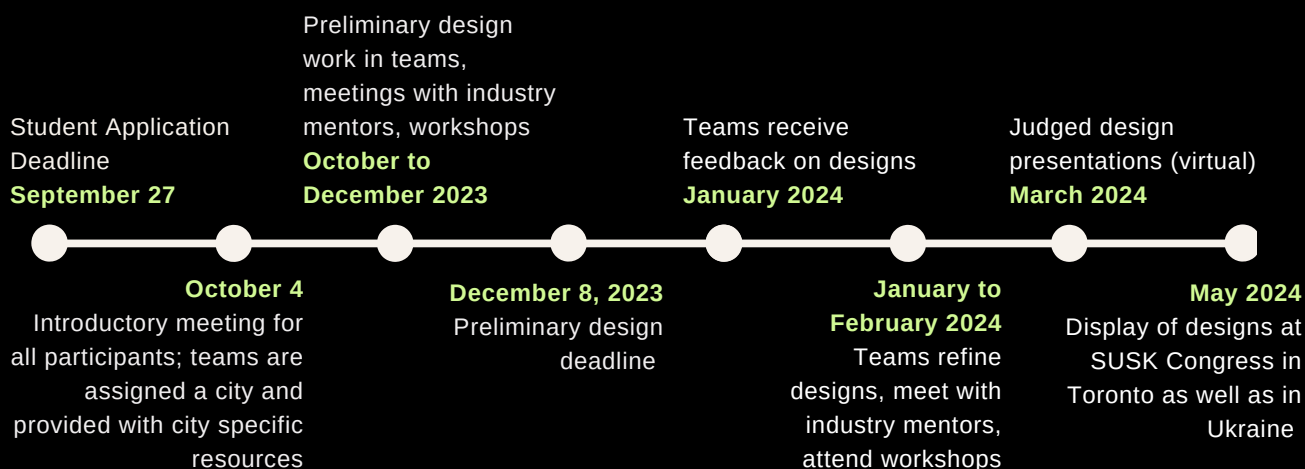
DESIGN MANDATE & SCOPE

Each student team will be assigned a small urban district (raion) in Ukraine. Most of these will be municipalities (hromada), roughly containing between 50,000 and 120,000 residents, that have been thoroughly devastated through the course of the invasion. Teams will then begin research into the city, through analysis of planning documents and news about these cities during the war, they come up with a future vision for how the city should look and function once rebuilding has been completed.

The three main design principles are as follows: Familiarity to residents, historic identity and expression of tragic loss, and the ideas of hope, resistance, and regeneration. The expectation is that, using multimedia graphic designs, teams will create a general overview of the new city, and include examples to showcase how each design principle have been incorporated into the overall design. These will be complemented with the core elements of accessibility, mobility, safety, and sustainability to create forward-thinking plans with tangible future applications.

GET INVOLVED

Students.

Participant Eligibility: Post-secondary undergraduate or masters students from Ukraine and Canada studying urban planning (Ukrainian students may be those currently still in Ukraine or those who recently moved from Ukraine and are studying abroad). Students from disciplines outside of urban planning may participate, but a limited number of spots are available. Ukrainian or English speaking; knowledge of both languages is an asset.

Teams : Will be made up of 5 urban planning with an additional 3 students from other disciplines. Each team is required to have at least 2 Ukrainian students and at least 2 Canadian students. Teams will be created based on preferences indicated on the application form as well as relative experience levels. Each team will be assigned a city and an industry expert with whom they will meet every other week to ask questions and stay on track

Cost: No cost to enter

Prizes and Compensation : any monetary compensation to students will be provided based on a need basis. As a result, each team will be given a lump sum of money (\$500-\$1000 CAD) that will be split amongst *Ukrainian students only*. Monetary prizes will also be awarded to top scoring teams at the end of the competition and will be split amongst *Ukrainian students only*.

The rebuilding effort in Ukraine is ongoing and professionals on the ground have already begun laying the ground work for urban planning designs. Therefore, this is a theoretical exercise that is meant to both educate students as well as raise awareness about destruction brought upon Ukrainian cities. Select design aspects from winning presentations will be shared with urban planning firms in Ukraine in an effort to share student efforts and innovative ideas.
