Short Course Description

In special cases and with the approval of the Director of the school, a student may study an advanced topic under the direction of a faculty member.

Course Format

Students seeking to initiate a Directed Studies course should begin by preparing a brief outline (approximately one page) describing the proposed project. The outline should primarily deal with the scope and subject matter to be covered over the duration of the course. It should be in sufficient detail to indicate that the content does not substantially overlap with other courses at UBC and is within an area of academic competence of a member of the Planning faculty. In addition, the outline should indicate the method of study (e.g. library research) and the results to be offered for evaluation.

Content

With permission of the Program Chair (Masters or PhD, as appropriate), students may individually or in small groups engage in independent studies under the supervision of a member of faculty who is capable of guiding their work in an area of special interest not otherwise covered in the curriculum. Most Directed Studies courses are extensions into greater depth of a topic covered in one or more regular courses, and thus are generally of interest only to second year students.

Registration

Students wishing to register for a Directed Studies course are required to complete a "Directed Studies Application Form" form, available on the <u>SCARP forms page</u>. Students must also prepare a one-page outline (described under "Course Organization" below). Students must complete and submit the form and accompanying outline to the <u>Graduate Administrator</u> in order register and receive credit for a Directed Studies course.

A maximum of six credits of Directed Studies courses may be used for credit toward a student's graduate degree.
